Director's Report

2. Manager's Report – Jay Atwood

Staffing

There are forty-five (45) applicants in the screening process for the Emergency Communications Dispatcher position. Thirty-nine (39) candidates were sent typing tests and ten (10) were sent to the suitability assessment. There are thirteen (13) candidates in background and Executive Director Atwood has interviewed a couple of candidates. We are expecting up to three (3) people at the September Academy. Of the six (6) lateral applications, we are providing a conditional offer to one (1) applicant.

Executive Director Atwood will be reviewing the first cut on the current round of applications for the IS Manager position.

Carole Cimrhakl, Administrative Assistant, retired on July 16th, and we will be recruiting for the full-time Administrative Assistant position.

Microwave

The project remains on track. The Franklin County ring will be completed in the first week of August and the Benton County ring should be completed in September. Systems are scheduled to be fully tested in October with system acceptance in December.

Classroom training on the Microwave System for Franklin County is scheduled for August and Benton County is tentatively scheduled for September.

Radio System

Day Wireless has completed the apparatus census and found there were sixty less than anticipated resulting in cost savings for this project. The next step is getting an estimate for the radio installation.

Executive Director Atwood will be traveling to Chicago with Motorola in August for system staging for the Benton County upgrade components. Another staging event is scheduled for March to review the Franklin County upgrade components. At these events, they set the system up in lab environment to see how it operates before shipping them for installation. The gear will be installed by end of this year and will create system redundancy so if one site fails, there is a backup set up to keep systems running.

Emergency Management

The funding provided from the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) is cut off moving forward due to new federal regulations. It may reopen later this year but due to the state's perspective and pending lawsuits, it may not be available. To cover the loss of EMPG funding, payroll for staff who have minimal to no duties for Emergency Management were reallocated. This includes moving 12% for the CAD Analyst from Emergency Management to E911.

Approximately \$40,000 of Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSP) funds are allocated towards the VHF engineering study. Executive Director Atwood and Richland Fire Chief Huntington confirmed these funds will be reallocated to fund CodeRed in 2026 and 2027.

Independence Task Force

They recommend hiring professional help to prepare the ballot measure for the public safety tax. A workshop with elected officials to review progress and next steps is recommended. The attorney stated that each county will need to run the public safety tax and get it passed. The PDA sets the organization up to receive the funds but cannot run the tax. A new interlocal with the counties and user entities is being prepared and will detail how we would use these funds and steps to move forward, such as a matching charter or ordinance in both counties. This is required before the tax can be added to the ballot. SECOMM (Southeast Emergency Communications) is the recommended name for the new organization.

3. Transfer of Funds from Fund Balance/Reserves for Gate Replacement – Approval

This transfer of funds from SECOMM Fund Balance in the amount of \$33,526 is to fund the replacement of the security gate which has been stuck open for most of the year. After multiple attempts to fix the gate, to safeguard our assets and ensure security for staff, the gate is being replaced.

ERIN ERDMAN MOVED AND MICHAEL ALVAREZ SECONDED THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE TRANSFER OF \$33,526 FROM SECOMM FUND BALANCE FOR THE GATE REPLACEMENT AND TO ALLOW STAFF TO MAKE THE NECESSARY BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS. MOTION CARRIED 12-0.

4. E911 Coordinator Professional Development (CPD) Contract E26-018 - Approval

This annual contract in the amount of \$92,152 is for state mandated travel, 9-1-1 call taker, CAD/GIS and other training and state sponsored programs that exclusively support 9-1-1, translation services for emergency calls and public education materials and travel.

July 2025 Statistical Information

9-1-1 Calls = 12,462

Training

We have completed call-taking training for one employee. Their initial certification application has been received and is waiting for approval from the Certification Board.

One employee completed law position training in August. This employee and two others were approved by the Certification Board as dual certified call taker and law dispatcher.

We have Data training scheduled for two employees in November.

Our CTO group has nearly completed the Hilt Academy School of Leadership; that will conclude in December.

We have an EMD class scheduled for November 12-14 and are hosting two Hanford POC employees as well as out two call takers. This will include any new hires that start before the class.

Our next call taking class is scheduled for October 20. We have the potential for 5 employees for this class. We are planning for the next class to start November 17 for anyone in the process that can't start on October 20.

We are still waiting to hear back from the Certification Board about the approval of our training program. The reviewers asked for additional information that was provided, and we are still in a holding pattern to hear if the program will be approved.

Benton County Emergency Management (BCEM) - Deanna Davis

Planning

Two community outreach events were held during the week of September 8th as part of the adoption process for the updated preliminary Benton County Flood Insurance Rate Maps. When FEMA releases preliminary maps, it initiates a public review process that allows community members to submit comments and appeals during the 90-day appeal period. Although FEMA has collected the latest technical information about flood risk, it is crucial that people affected by these maps share their feedback and local knowledge. Comments and appeals can be submitted through the jurisdiction's local floodplain administrator.

The first public meeting was held in Benton City on September 9th and was attended by approximately 40 residents. The second meeting took place on September 10th at the Richland Public Library and was attended by approximately 30 residents. FEMA representatives and their contractors were to do the following:

- Present the preliminary maps
- Explain the process and science behind the flood map updates
- Compare old maps versus new maps
- Outline the process for public comment submission

Residents had the opportunity to meet individually with FEMA representatives, project contractors, and engineers to ask questions about how the updated flood maps affect their specific properties.

Exercise

The FEMA evaluated Hostile Action Based Columbia Generating Station exercises are on February 24th and March 24th. February 24th will be the "practice" exercise in preparation for the March 24th FEMA evaluated Columbia Generating Station Hostile Action Based Exercise. This type of scenario is only demonstrated once every 8 years and the premise is that a Hostile Action against the plant has occurred. Our response to this type of event will differ from our "normal" CGS exercises. This type of event will be more law enforcement centric with SWAT and BCSO having a larger role in coordination with CGS security and relaying the essential information from the Incident command post back to the EOC.

Siren Testing

The siren testing will occur on October 16th from 10 am - 12 am. The annual siren test will include sirens along the Columbia and Yakima rivers and in portions of both Benton and Franklin counties within about 10 miles of Columbia Generating Station. The siren test will be heard throughout these areas and along the Columbia River between the Vernita Bridge and Leslie Groves Park in north Richland. Sirens will also be heard at the Horn Rapids Off-Road Vehicle Park, Rattlesnake Mountain Shooting Facility, Columbia Generating Station and adjoining areas. Additionally, Benton and Franklin Counties will test their CodeRed system for residents living within approximately 10 miles of Columbia Generating Station only. This will not be a county wide test.

Radio and Microwave Project Update - Jay Atwood

The Franklin County microwave system was completed and cutover to the new system in August. The Benton County MPLS and T1 cutover to the new system is planned for mid-October. We will have all the old microwave equipment and antenna systems decommissioned by mid-November.

The new Courthouse Subsite and DSR Core equipment has been received and inventoried. We are working on installation schedules at this time and will have a project schedule out soon. The Courthouse is planned for installation and turn up by November 2025 with a goal prior to the Thanksgiving break. The DSR core will be installed over the next couple of months but cannot go live until the system upgrade is completed in January next year. It is expected to be online in February 2026.

We placed a large mobile subscriber order in September. The subscriber codeplug is being finalized by your team. Once completed, we will begin programming and testing both mobile and portable subscribers with a goal to complete these no later than the end of the year. We will be selecting a contractor for installing the subscribers over the next couple of months in preparation for installation in Q1 2026.

We are having a small delay with site acquisitions but have identified paths forward to push through and have these completed by the end of November. Once these have been solidified, we will schedule our final design review and get the remaining subsite equipment ordered. We are still planning for staging and receiving of the equipment in March next year with an anticipated build-out schedule beginning in April 2026.







Aurelian Contract - Approval

Recommended Motion

Approve the contract for Aurelian in the amount of \$125,005 using payroll savings and authorize staff to make the necessary budget adjustments.

Summary

Aurelian is AI software used by dispatch centers across the state and nationwide to handle non-emergency calls. The AI software will answer all non-emergency calls to collect information and route calls based on SECOMM's protocols. Aurelian will engage the caller in natural conversation (recognizing and speaking in multiple languages when necessary) and summarize the information gathered for our dispatchers. It will save a significant amount time on routine administrative calls and reduce the workload for non-emergency calls so that our emergency communications dispatchers can direct their focus to handling 911 and monitoring critical radio traffic.

Fiscal Impact

The cost for the first year is \$125,005, including tax. It will be funded using payroll savings due to vacant positions. The renewal cost is \$141,310 per year. The funding for future years will be reevaluated after a review of the service.




